## <u>USA Funds, Christel House Academy providing inner-city students</u> <u>more higher education opportunities</u>

Indianapolis, Ind. – Inner-city, at-risk high school seniors at Christel House Academy South (CHAS) will have additional support for their university aspirations, thanks to a generous grant from USA Funds. The nonprofit awarded a \$10,000 grant to CHAS to support activities such as college visits, SAT and ACT prep, college application completion assistance and "Freshman Survival Kits." These kits consist of a suitcase, bedding and other necessary supplies that will help students to be successful away from home.

In order to earn a high school diploma at CHAS, it is mandatory for every senior to have a college acceptance letter in hand. Every senior is encouraged to apply to at least three colleges/universities – a "dream" school, a "reality" school and a back-up.

"In keeping with our mission to enhance postsecondary education preparedness, access and success, USA Funds is delighted to support the College Trailblazers initiative," said Carol D'Amico, USA Funds executive vice president, National Engagement and Philanthropy. "We are pleased that our funding will help low-income, first-generation students make the transition from high school to college, so that they have the opportunity to enjoy successful, fulfilling careers."
